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Corporation for Supportive Housing (CSH) Marks 20 Years of Leadership and Innovation

CSH Honored Partners with Champions of Supportive Housing Awards

New York, NY—October 19, 2011—CSH celebrated 20 years of leading the national supportive housing movement yesterday at The Prince George Ballroom in New York City. The event featured a keynote address from *New York Times* best-selling author and Food Network television personality Chef Jeff Henderson, panel discussions on the state of the supportive housing industry from a local and national perspective, and an awards ceremony honoring fellow supportive housing innovators and partners.

For the past 20 years CSH has worked with partners throughout the country to bring supportive housing to the forefront as a solution to ending and preventing homelessness for the our nation's most vulnerable populations including veterans, families and children, formerly incarcerated individuals, and chronically homeless individuals. Yesterday's event celebrated the supportive housing industry's accomplishments and while looking toward the future.

The celebration was made more special by the introduction of a Resolution in the United States Senate by Senators Robert Menendez (D-NJ) and Rob Portman (R-OH) recognizing our 20 years of work to end homelessness through the creation of supportive housing.

During the awards presentation hosted by CSH Chair of the Board of Directors Denise O'Leary, CSH honored partners and supporters who have aided in the supportive housing movement. Award recipients included:

Lifetime Champion: Robert Hohler

CSH honored the late Robert Hohler with the Lifetime Champion Award. The former executive director of Melville Charitable Trust and long-time CSH partner was a force for good and saw the potential for philanthropy to go beyond funding. His vision to create a national platform, Funders Together to End Homelessness, to advance solutions for ending homelessness has resulted in communities across the country embracing evidenced-based practices to house the most vulnerable families and individuals.

Funding Champion: Robert Wood Johnson Foundation

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation is one of CSH's largest—and longest—funders. A leader in philanthropy, RWJF has worked with CSH on such initiatives as *Taking Health Care Home*, which helped communities across the country to work on the intersection of housing and health; the *Returning Home Initiative*, which is establishing supportive housing as an essential component of reintegrating formerly incarcerated people

into communities; and most recently on *Keeping Families Together*, which is demonstrating that supportive housing can help some of the country's most vulnerable and high-risk families.

Champion Supportive Housing Project: Anishinabe Wakiagun, Minneapolis, MN

For 15 years, Anishinabe Wakiagun has served American Indians and others in Minneapolis. The program demonstrates an approach to providing safe, affordable service-supported housing for homeless people through a Housing First, Harm Reduction model. The housing was based on findings that most American Indians who were homeless were single adults, chemically dependent and were staying, not in shelters, but outside or in detox. The project became an example for others in the supportive housing field looking to work with people addressing similar issues.

Champion Supportive Housing Project: Direct Access to Housing, San Francisco, CA

Direct Access to Housing is a supportive housing program that strives to help low-income San Francisco residents stabilize their housing and improve their health despite co-occurring mental health issues, substance abuse problems and chronic medical conditions. Direct Access to Housing currently houses close to 1,300 formerly homeless persons across 29 sites. The program is significant for its vision on how to serve people who were "high utilizers" of its public health systems and for its effective work with property owners and the local nonprofit housing and service community.

Champion Supportive Housing Project: Cedar Avenue, New York, NY

Cedar Avenue, the newest affordable housing program of Community Access, opened its doors in March 2011 to provide affordable housing to low-income families and individuals with psychiatric disabilities. This pioneering project was a first-time funding collaboration among the State Office of Mental Health, state housing finance agencies and private investment entities in a mixed-tenancy project. It represents how supportive housing and affordable housing can be fully integrated, and how nonprofit and private developers can successfully work together.

Government Champions: The New York/New York Agreements

The New York/New York Supportive Housing Agreements epitomize the kind of cross-sector, multi-agency collaboration needed to end and prevent homelessness. They are an inspiration and model for states and local jurisdictions across the country. Starting with the first Agreement in 1990, this unique program has brought city agencies, developers and service providers to the table to create supportive housing that meets the needs of New York's homeless mentally ill population. NY/NY III was and remains today the largest effort and investment in supportive housing by any state or jurisdiction around the country.
