Since 2004, Ms. Rosenberg has served as President and CEO of the National Council for Community Behavioral Healthcare, a not-for-profit advocacy and educational association of organizations that provide treatment and support services to adults and children with mental illnesses and addictions. Under Rosenberg’s leadership, the National Council helped secure the passage of the federal mental health and addiction parity law; expanded financing for integrated behavioral health/primary care services; and was instrumental in bringing behavioral health to the table in federal healthcare reform. A certified social worker, family therapist, and psychiatric rehabilitation practitioner, Ms. Rosenberg has over 30 years of experience in mental health policy and practice.
