



The Leah Residence

Twenty-three supportive housing units in a new construction for the homeless. There are 12 studio units, six one-bedroom units and six two-bedroom units. One of the units is set aside for the resident manager.

Tenant Profile:

Units are dedicated for people who are homeless and have at least one household member with a special need.

Service Approach:

All services are voluntary.

Key Features and Innovations:

- The Leah Residence is co-located with Rachel Women's Center, Catholic Charities' women's drop in center.
- The building's driving design philosophy was to create a space for tenants, who had experienced homeless and mental illness, to live with dignity.
- The Leah Residence includes a designated office for a part time Service Coordinator, separate from the Resident Manager's office.

Additional Project Information

Maximum income: 30% AMI (tenants pay 30% of their income towards rent – maximum income is 30% AMI)

Staffing: 40 hours/week on-site service coordinator, and live-in resident manager.

Status: Fully occupied as of July 2005

Capital Financing Sources: tax credits, public agency loans, CCDC funds, SDHC funds, Home funds, Catholic Charities, conventional commercial financing, HUD – McKinney-Vento SHP, and FHLB AHP.

Operating: Project Based Section 8

Services: HUD Supportive Housing Program

Twenty-eight (28) residents live at The Leah Residence. Eight (8) are working full-time in such fields as social service, retail, customer service, Sea World, and food services. Six (6) are working part-time in social services, and secretarial positions. Four (4) households currently include adolescent children. Design features greatly enhance and promote a sense of community and beauty in the building. An inscription in the courtyard reads:

About Catholic Charities Diocese of San Diego (CCDSD)

Catholic Charities Diocese of San Diego provides a wide range of community services with a mission “to advocate for a just society, to call men and women to action on behalf of the poor, and to promote self-determination for all” since 1919.
