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# What is a triage tool?





Photo courtesy of Jovenes, Inc.

- A quick assessment that can be delivered to identify those youth at the greatest need for supportive housing.
- Agencies may "cream" easiest to work with youth into housing, leaving most vulnerable and needy behind.
- Current tools that exist to prioritize homeless adults are not appropriate for youth.

### **Tools for Adult Homeless**



### Vulnerability Index

 Common Ground's tool: identifies and prioritizes housing according to the fragility of their health

### 10<sup>th</sup> Decile Crisis Indicator

 triage tool based on identifying those 10<sup>th</sup> percentile of highest cost homeless adults

#### SPDAT

 acuity based on wellness, risks, history of housing, and socialization and daily functioning

## The problem with Million Dollar Murray



- Million Dollar Murray Malcolm Gladwell's New Yorker piece mobilized political will
- Vulnerability Index and 10<sup>th</sup> Decile Crisis Indicator tool both based on risk of death and system costs (primarily health care)
- So what do we use as the anchor?
  - CAB and I both agreed on "long-term homelessness"





# Why is a triage tool for homeless youth needed?

# GOAL: Identify homeless youth with greatest need for supportive housing.

- Target supportive housing for the most vulnerable youth facing multiple barriers to accessing and retaining housing, and who need supportive services.
- Prevent chronic homelessness as adults. 50% of chronically homeless adults were homeless as transition age youth.




<u>Recommendation</u>: Embed the following questions in broader intake/assessment process. Prioritize SH for youth who score 4+ points.

### The approach – What we did



- 1. Selected 5+ years as working definition of "long-term" homelessness.
- Run controlling for age, the odds of 5+ years homeless with every possible variable suggested by the literature – 40+ items
- 3. Select the sub-set of variables with significant associations.
- 4. Enter these variables into a multivariate model & reduce model to only significant associations.




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# How long is "long-term"?

### The approach – What kinds of risk?



- Reasons for Leaving Home: 19 different reasons for becoming homeless (e.g. "I experienced sexual abuse." "my desire for adventure")
- Early Risk Taking: Alcohol use, marijuana use, first sexual experience at age 12 or younger
- **Traumatic Experiences**: 8 different traumatic experiences (e.g. "being hit, punched or kicked very hard at home."); A brief 4-item screen for PTSD symptoms

#### Other Important Issues:

- Foster care involvement, incarceration prior to age 18
- Employment, high school drop out, HIV positive status, testing positive for other STI's, sleeping on the streets currently, having children, being pregnant (or impregnating someone), trading sex for money, food, drugs, housing or other resources
- Sexual orientation, gender, race/ethnicity



# Triage Tool Training Practice

### **Voluntary Participation**



- Use youth-friendly language
- Let them know that you will not share their names with anyone outside your organization
- Let them know their participation does not affect their program participation
- If they are willing to give you the data but not have it shared then mark the top of the form "NOT TO BE SHARED" and don't share it.
- As a thank you for participating, youth will be given \$10.



### **Demographics**



#### **Gender**

- Sensitive question! Don't assume!
- Ask, "What gender do you identify as? Male, female, or transgender?"
- If participant answers "Transgender," then ask: "Do you identify as someone who was born in a male body but feel or live as a woman [transgender woman]? Or do you identify as someone who was born in a female body but feel or live as a man [transgender man]?"



Sex assigned at birth a male, identifies now as a woman

Sex assigned at birth a female, identifies now as a man

- Again, do not assume!
- Ask, "Which of the following races do you identify as?" Read ALL response options.
- Check off all appropriate response options.
- If they respond "mixed race" check the multiple races they identify with

### **Literal Homelessness**



- First ask, "In the past 12 months, have you spent the night in any of the following places?"
- If none, mark "None of these" and move to back page.
- If any are marked, ask "In the past 30 days, did you stay in X place?" Do this for all of the past 12 months locations.
  - If none, mark "None of these."
  - Otherwise mark appropriate check boxes in "Past 30 days" column
