Getting to the roots

While each person's story is unique, many people fall into homelessness for the following reasons:



Rising rent & housing costs



Stagnant wages



Insufficient affordable & supportive housing



Inadequate funding for health and human services



Racist housing practices

Rising rent & housing costs

This year, rent prices rose more than 15% nationwide while inflation and rising interest rates are pricing many out of the housing market.



Stagnant wages

One study found that from 1985 to 2020, the national median rent price rose 149%, while overall income grew by 35%. Pandemic-induced inflation is worsening the gap between rent costs and wages.



Insufficient affordable & supportive housing

The country needs more than 7 million affordable homes for nearly 11 million families with very low incomes.



Inadequate funding for health and human services

Disinvestment and cumulative cuts in funding for health and human services has resulted in an uncoordinated and siloed system of care.



Racist housing practices

More than century-long practices of legal housing discrimination and deliberate segregation prevented many Black and Indigenous Americans from owning homes and building wealth across generations. These government-backed racist housing practices include the Dawes Act of 1887, redlining, and explicit race-based zoning laws.
