Grounded in Strategy, Growing Impact

A 2023-24 Reflection

The year 2023 kick started our strategic plan, which combined with our entrepreneurial approach, and nonpartisan advocacy, which provided us a solid foundation for both organizational growth and local community impact. CSH's relentless focus on strengthening the field and empowering those who build and manage supportive housing led to creating new pipelines for housing, preserving existing housing, and leveraging private and public resources to fund the services that are so critical to the model's success.

Creating new supportive housing pipelines begins with our technical assistance and training. Through signature initiatives like the CSH Supportive Housing Institutes, as well as consulting, financial modeling, and needs assessments, we equip communities with the tools to turn complex challenges into actionable results.

Our Community Investment team accelerated new housing development by providing critical financial support—through loans, New Markets Tax Credit (NMTC) investments, and grants. Reinvesting our financial capital jumpstarted new supportive housing projects across the country.

We also advanced funding for supportive housing services through advocacy and our comprehensive analysis of Medicaid as a source of funding for housing related services. Through our advocacy with state lawmakers, Nevada and Michigan passed historic legislation funding supportive housing.

Further, we helped providers advocate in their states for supportive housing services benefits through Medicaid, and guided providers with strategies for leveraging Medicaid for creating new supportive housing in states that currently offer waivers.

The progress we made throughout 2023 and 2024 positioned us well to effectively navigate changing political headwinds that undoubtedly will bring new challenges.

We remain grateful to our funders, partners, collaborators, and advocates who joined us in our mission ensuring that everyone has a safe place to call home and a community where they can thrive.

Supportive Housing Institutes

Forming Collaborations to Turn Vision into Housing

Throughout 2023 and 2024, we hosted 16 Supportive Housing Institutes, including a milestone 15th Institute in Indiana, bringing together more than 90 teams across 10 states.

A signature CSH initiative, the Supportive Housing Institute unites housing developers and service providers to form collaborative teams that design viable supportive housing projects. Over several months, these teams engage in intensive workshops, culminating in final presentations where they showcase their project plans.

Most of these projects are now underway or progressing toward implementation, turning vision for housing into viable development projects.


Creating New Homes and Services Funding Through Technical Assistance and Advocacy

Homes end homelessness. Every new unit of supportive and affordable housing we create offers stability and dignity to individuals, couples, or families who might otherwise face homelessness. In 2023 and 2024, we helped create more than 50,000 new supportive housing units through TA and on-the-ground advocacy efforts — a major step toward our goal of 150,000 units by 2027.

Advocating for Services Funding

Quality services are critical for supportive housing to be effective for individual tenants and the community at large. CSH advocates at the federal and state levels for adequate funding and through our TA, helps communities leverage every opportunity available to secure funding and report on outcomes.

CSH Advocacy in Action

30 states

As of December 2024, 30 states have authorized Medicaid to cover supportive housing services through their state programs—an increase from 22 states the previous year.

CSH advocates for Housing-Related Services (HRS) to be formally recognized as supportive housing services eligible for Medicaid coverage at the state level.

These programs include the ability to access Medicaid funding for HRS and give states the potential to scale the evidenced-based model of supportive housing

\$32 million

In 2023, Nevada established its firstever Supportive Housing Development Fund with a \$32 million state appropriation. The fund includes \$30 million for comprehensive supportive housing services, \$1.5 million to build long-term capacity among developers and providers, and \$700,000 for evaluation and impact measurement.

CSH and the Nevada Housing Coalition partnered with Assemblywoman Daniele Monroe-Moreno (D) to advocate for the legislation. The Nevada state legislature passed the legislation with near-uninimous support and the governor signed it into law shortly after.

\$20 million

In a historic move, the Michigan Legislature appropriated S20 million in the fiscal year 2024 budget to fund supportive housing services through the Michigan Supportive Services Transformation Fund (SSTF)—based on CSH's national SSTF funding model.

The investment closed a S25 million gap in service funding to ensure long-term stability for individuals experiencing homelessness. CSH worked with Ann Abor-based Avalon Housing to advocate for the much-needed funding. State Senator Jeff Irwin and former State Representative Felicia Brabec championed the funding.

Building the Field

CSH 2023 Supportive Housing Summit | Philadelphia

In June 2023, CSH hosted its most well-attended Supportive Housing Summit to date in Philadelphia, drawing more than 1,000 participants. With the theme "Building the Field," attendees left equipped with tools and a network of practitioners dedicated to advancing supportive housing as a data-driven, cost-effective solution to homelessness.

It was CSH's first in-person Summit since the COVID pandemic.

Plenary speaker Matthew Desmond, sociologist and Maurice P. During Professor of Sociology at Princeton University, spoke about his newly published book, "Poverty, By America."

Drawing from his research, Professor Desmond explained that poverty in the United States persists not due to scarcity, but because it is actively sustained by systems that benefit from inequality.

His critique of housing policy underscored the urgent need for stable, affordable homes. Supportive housing answers this call—offering both a home and the services needed to break the cycle of poverty and promote lasting stability.



Building the Field Through Training

The CSH Training Center equips professionals across the supportive housing field—from frontline staff and supervisors to property managers and service providers—with practical knowledge and skills to improve housing stability and quality of life for tenants.

Courses are offered live and on-demand, and are shaped by real-time developments in the field.

Trainings help participants navigate complex challenges and apply trauma-informed practices to deliver high-quality supportive housing.

Grounded in Evidence: Outcomes That Matter

National Institute of Justice Rates the Denver SIB as One of Nation's Most Effective Justice Solutions

The Denver Social Impact Bond (SIB) Initiative, a groundbreaking collaboration led by CSH and partners, was rated "Effective" by the National Institute of Justice's CrimeSolutions
Clearinghouse in 2023. The rating is one of the highest honors in the field. Using an innovative pay-for-success model, the initiative provided



supportive housing to hundreds of individuals with histories of chronic homelessness and justice involvement.

This recognition marks the first-ever supportive housing program to receive the "Effective" rating and only the second housing program overall to earn this distinction, underscoring the initiative's proven impact on reducing justice system interactions, improving housing stability, and enhancing health outcomes.

The FUSE 10-Year Follow-Up Report Showed that Supportive Housing is Cost-Effective and Impacts Stability Over the Long-Term

The CSH Frequent User Systems Engagement (FUSE) 10-Year Follow-Up Report published in 2023 by researchers from the Columbia University Mailman School of Public Health. The researchers conducted a critical, data-driven analysis showing that supportive housing is a cost-effective solution that helps reduce the utilization of local jails, prisons, and other crisis systems like emergency rooms and temporary shelters.

It was the first 10-year longitudinal study of supportive housing ever conducted. This report offered an unprecedented opportunity to examine the value of investments in supportive housing and its long-term impact on crisis systems and communities.



2023 Revenue and Expenses


2023 REVENUE
